Thank you for your interest in grow-outs for the Atlantic Regional Seed Bank! This year there are several varieties prioritized for grow-out. These varieties:

- (1) were banked 5 years or more ago
- (2) are not readily available (3 or fewer commercial sellers in Canada)
- (3) may have a low germination rate due to age (all seed will be tested before distribution) and require a bit of extra TLC.

Speedy arugula (Image credit: Territorial Seed)

Eruca vesicaria. Serrated, bright green leaves have the shape of wild arugula, but the mild peppery pungency of salad arugula.

Phaseolus vulgaris L.. A navy bean, registered out of Guelph University, in the 1980s. It's an

important bean in Canada, heavily used in bean breeding.
